UK Naval Component

UK maritime assets supporting the security operation to protect Iraq's off shore oil infra-structure were placed under the tactical control of the Multi-Nationally-led Combined Task Force 158, with command rotating between US, UK and Australian officers. It was renamed Combined Task Force – Iraqi Maritime in January 2009. In May 2009, Commodore James Morse RN assumed command of the task force for a four month long period. During this period the Type 23 frigates HMS Lancaster and HMS Richmond operated in Northern Arabian Gulf. The RFA Cardigan Bay operated in the NAG as a Mother Ship and Afloat Training Platform for Iraqi Marines. They were supported by a repair ship and a fleet tanker in the central Gulf, as well as the RAF Nimrod MR2 detachment at Seeb in Oman. UK maritime forces were designated CTF 330 by PJHQ.

Camp Bucca US-run Theater Internment Facility (Umm Qasr) Guarded by battalion sized detachment drawn from US Army Military Police Battalions, US Air Force Security Force Squadrons and US Navy Provisional Detainee Battalions, as well as Romanian Field Hospital.
